Our Autumn Meeting at Pulborough - 28th October

Reporting to our membership was the name of the game at our Autumn Meeting. Business matters such as previous minutes, apologies for absence and finance updates were swept out of the way, in favour of a packed programme of project reports. Initial reactions from the 150 or so members present seemed to be positive but as usual comments are welcome. Some highlights from the afternoon follow.



TSG/Gennets Bridge Lock (Eric Walker)

ennets Bridge Lock is practically complete (apart from gates and pumping equipment which will be fitted when navigation is possible) and looks excellent. The team has started to clear and landscape the site. A team from Natural England visited in August to inspect the Great Crested Newt conservation work and said it was exemplary. They could not believe that the pond volunteers had constructed near to the lock had not been installed by professionals. Eric briefly introduced options for the team to work in the Bonfire Hanger area, north of Gennets Bridge.

Summit Level (Tony Ford)

Of the several major projects needed on the Summit Level, Tickner's Heath Crossing is closest to being achievable. The problem is that the Dunsfold-Alfold road crosses the canal route on a causeway about one foot above the target water level (the original canal bridge was slightly nearer to Compasses). For a number of reasons, building a new canal bridge near to the causeway is not feasible. However, we have a 'cunning plan' to cross the road at a completely different point. Planning for this project is well advanced. We aim to use a similar design to Compasses Bridge and the estimated cost is in the region of £750,000.



Bramley Link (Philip Oliver)



There is plenty of work in progress at the moment and Philip broke it down into four sections (from north to south):

- 1. Gun's Mouth Island our plan is to establish a navigable channel past the island, near to the junction with the River Wey. Unfortunately this has been a 'sorry tale of inexperience'. We initially thought it was simple but the project has been beset by official changes of mind. Now we are about to submit a planning application and hope to start work in summer 2018. The cost will certainly be higher than the original estimate of around £20,000.
- 2. Phase 1 (A281 to Gosden Meadow) this is the main part of the plan to establish about 1km of new waterway

connecting to the River Wey. We are working towards public consultation and a planning application in early 2018. The cost is likely to be in the region of £3m and we plan to apply to the Heritage Lottery Fund for about 50% of this.

- 3. Phase 2 (Gosden Meadow to Birtley) this critical section, where the canal route is permanently blocked by a housing development, is for the long term in our planning. However, recent work to develop a Bramley Neighbourhood Plan has pushed us into showing our conceptual design for this section earlier than we might have wished. If the canal does not feature in the Neighbourhood Plan then we will have an uphill struggle with any future application. Our preference is now for a new canal route following the Downs Link (the former railway line).
- 4. Birtley Reach south of Bramley village we are hopeful of acquiring a 1km section of canal, where the Trust successfully repaired a major breach as early as 1976. Our plan is to restore the waterway, install bridges and create a circular walk.

Harsfold Bridge (Nigel Yarwood)

Currently a causeway blocks the canal route at the site of Harsfold Bridge, near Wisborough Green. Removing



this blockage is the key to opening up a stretch of about 2km between Lordings/Orfold and Lee Farm. The causeway carries a farm track and a public bridleway. We have been working on this project for about two years and now we have submitted a planning application to Horsham District

Council. The plan is for a simple bridge that could be largely constructed by volunteers.

Drungewick Lock (Brian King)

The lock is at the southern end of the Loxwood navigable section. Roy Sutton, Honorary Consultant Engineer with the Inland Waterways Association has advised us that there is a significant risk that the offside (non-towpath) side of the lock could fail. The lock is currently closed to

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The aim of the Wey & Arun Canal Trust is the preservation and restoration of the former inland waterway route between the Rivers Wey and Arun, with a view to reopening this to navigation.

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navigation. Roy has pointed us to a similar lock (Woolsthorpe Top Lock 18 on the Grantham Canal) which did actually fail in similar conditions. Currently we are carefully monitoring the movement in the wall. Although there are a number of ideas for possible remedial measures, so far we have no definite plans. We are carrying out a feasibility study covering a range of options.

Finance, Legacies and Grants

The Trust has spending and saving years.
Unless something really unexpected
happens, 2017 looks like a saving year, when
we build up our resources for future projects.

In 2017 up to the date of the Autumn Meeting our income (including money raised by the Boat Group) was £406,000 and we have spent £191,000, so we have added £215,000 to our reserves. In 2016, we ran down our reserves by £192,000.

We are grateful for all support, but some of the most valuable contributions have included:

- A grant of £75,000 from the MJ Camp Trust, a long-term supporter;
- A legacy of £48,400 from former members Mr & Mrs Holland and other legacies totalling £20,000;
- £66,000 raised by our hardworking Boat Group.

Richard Stephens leaves Board

Richard Stephens has stepped down from his position as a Director of the Wey & Arun Canal Trust. We are most grateful to Richard for his contribution and pleased that he will continue to work as a valued member of the Bramley Link team.

Rob Searle retires

During October, Rob Searle retired from the staff of the Wey & Arun Canal Trust. Rob was appointed as Fundraising Assistant in 2014 but his expertise from many years in journalism was too valuable for us to ignore. Rob took responsibility for our press relations and contributed extensively to our publications. When the pressure on volunteer resources became too heavy in 2015/16, Rob acted as a key member of the *Wey-South* team.

In his fundraising role. Rob succeeded in winning some significant grants for the Trust on projects including Compasses Bridge and the Shalford Visitor Centre, Rob's work for the Trust was not limited to the back office: he also led walks and staffed our publicity stand at a variety of events. Often working as a volunteer, Rob helped to organise events



including the concert by the Bourne Concert Band in February 2016.

From WACT HQ we would like to thank Rob for his exceptional contribution to the Trust's work and wish him a very happy retirement.

Some of the jobs on our planning checklist can be done from home, some need to be more mobile, likely entailing visits to sites and third-party providers from time to time to gather information, undertake research, check on progress and attend meetings. You will gain personal satisfaction from involvement in constructive team-working leading to benefits for the local community, wildlife and heritage, all at the same time and on your doorstep!

This appeal for help relates not only to preparations for canal restoration. We also

need more volunteers to assist the Wey-South magazine editor (either sourcing a news item that deserves to be reported, taking photographs of a specific news item, or editing a submitted article ready for design work). Similarly, we are short of members to help with our various events – could you organise an opening event perhaps? I emphasise that you will be given a full briefing for the task, and support as you find your feet.

The continuing success of our project will depend on the amount of volunteer assistance we can call on. Of course, the option exists to recruit paid staff, but experience suggests that the deepest loyalty to restoring and sustaining the canal is from our volunteers. We are proud of our many achievements and the resilience we have established over more than 45 years as a volunteer-led enterprise, not only because of the personal satisfaction gained from involvement, but also the camaraderie that isn't always a hallmark of paid work.

Boat Group - celebrating a successful season

Our Boat Group has had an excellent season, with another welcome increase in the funds raised for the Trust's restoration and maintenance work. It is no secret that the pressure on the team has been exceptionally heavy at times, especially with a limited pool of trained skippers. Several times the Granary office has resorted to calling every skipper on the list to fill a slot. So far it is the team's proud boast that no promised charter trip has been cancelled, but frankly it has sometimes been fairly close.

One of the reasons for the good financial results is that we increased some of the prices substantially for this season, expecting that the demand might reduce. Realising that we were close to capacity, we also limited the number of charter bookings we accepted. We are delighted that our customers have still been keen to book, even if it sometimes meant changing their trip date.

Of course we are doing everything we can to increase the number of skippers and crew so

that we can run more trips. Thanks to a huge amount of work by the Training team, led by Mark Eyre, 25 new crew have qualified this year and nine potential new skippers have started training.

Late News: We congratulate Martin Smithers who obtained his Boatmaster's Licence on 1st November and is now a fully qualified skipper.






Midweek Working Party

A ugust was a busy month for our working party with record numbers attending on some weeks and very low numbers on others due to the different weather conditions

We had three separate weeks at Loxwood clearing the canal of timber and reeds as far as the slipway at Drungewick, clearing the towpath of brambles and weeds and also working on the car park at Loxwood. This should make it easier for boats to navigate and the boat customers to have a better view as well as making the area look much tidier. In between we have been back to Hunt Park where we took out more of the Gosden Aqueduct bricks from Cranleigh Waters, ground down a large trunk to clear the end of the aqueduct, cleared a great deal of Himalayan Balsam and reseeded one of the Cranleigh river banks where flood repair had been completed.

We have been back to Haybarn where some of the group reduced the height of 50 yards of a hedge to 5ft 6 in. This job is made more difficult by most branches having to be lopped as they are very thick, having been left rather too long. Others in the group continued to clear the bed of the canal and banks. Eventually we will clear the whole length between Haybarn and Harsfold bridge.

September and October saw the group busy in different places, including Rooks Hill Farm, Rushetts, and two different sites at Haybarn. At Rooks Hill we had one person digging test holes to see what the filled in part of the canal contained. Six of the group cleared saplings from the base of the canal while others cleared the base of the canal at Rushetts of bramble and other shrubs. Meanwhile, at Haybarn, some of the group continued to clear the base of the canal of willows and other shrubs and others cut the hedge. This is a long job which I think will take most of the winter to complete. The latest outing was to Birtley where we are clearing the north east side to establish the state of the bank. Many

of the group have not worked on this part of the canal before, and it is good to be on a part of the canal that is still in water.

Hedgelaying Group

The Hedgelaying holiday season was broken by me giving the Southland Lock hedge a trim on 15th July which took me all day.

The Group has since re-formed on 26th September for the 2017/18 season. We have now spent six days at the Slinfold site. This work is mainly for obtaining stakes and binders but also entails some hedgelaying as a quid pro quo. We have now almost completed

pollarding five rows of hazel trees. This work has produced 200-plus stakes and binders. 40 stakes and binders have gone into the 20 yards of hedge we have laid so far this season.

A lot of brash has come out of the hedge as the plants are 20-30 feet tall with a lot of heavy branches bent over to overhang the next property. We have also had to fell eight overlarge trees and remove lower branches from four major trees. The bonfire has been

going non-stop on every visit and has only just coped with all of the material. It produced so much fallout of airborne ash that our cars looked like they had been parked at Pompeii.

I really need another 100 stakes and binders before starting the canalside laying between Haybarn and Harsfold which I hope we will obtain before Christmas.

Another problem is that we have lost three competent members of the team to ill health. This brings the group down to six as we welcomed a novice, Alistair, who joined us this season. I am working him in slowly on all the aspects of coppicing, pollarding and laying. These are all very labour-intensive tasks so a stable group is worth its weight in gold or bacon butties.

Northern and Summit Working Party

Work at Compasses during August concentrated on tidying and dismantling the site support facilities, so that the area can return to nature. Additionally, the improvements to the towpath have continued. All materials stored on site have been salvaged pending their use in the next major project.

In September we had a visit from London Waterway Recovery Group who, as well as very kindly presenting a cheque to the Trust from London IWA, installed the concrete footing for the final retaining wall at Compasses and concreted the steps to the landing stage.

October saw the start of big plans. The first long weekend visit from Newbury Working Party Group (NWPG) was followed by a WRG week-long work camp from 22nd to 28th, diverted from the Grantham and Chelmer navigations. The NWPG visit was split between sites. At Compasses, JJ Price has now finished the fourth and final retaining wall for the bridge, meaning that there are only a few small tasks outstanding.

At Hunt Park, the uncompleted work from the June working party was tackled. We successfully finished the job and we hope the path should be protected from any future flooding. The Sunday was a glorious autumn day and it was pleasing to note that the park was being well used by picnickers, people fishing, jogging and strolling - a real amenity for all.

The work camp gave us a great opportunity to kickstart the new slipway. NWPG had spent three days digging a vast hole for the structure which revealed the incredibly thick layer of blue clay that lies under this section of canal. Our local team prefabricated the steel reinforcing cages to support the concrete side walls. This readied the site for the camp, led by Rob Nicholson, to set the cages into the hole, casting them in concrete at the correct level. The second part of the week was spent building and fixing the shuttering for the southern wall of the slipway, a lengthy and complex task. The target was the booked concrete delivery for lunch time on the Friday. The team worked under lights until 19.30 the previous evening and had about five minutes to spare between completing the frame and arrival of the concrete. The pour went smoothly, with the results due to be revealed when the shuttering comes down in early November.

Next to the slipway, a row of piles is being driven along the canal bank to provide an unloading wharf for spoil when we recommence the desilting operation.

We have much to keep us busy over the winter months. In November, London WRG will progress both the wharf and the northern side wall of the slipway. If you would like to help us in this interesting project please let either Bill Nicholson or Dave Evans know and we can provide more details of the plans for any particular day.

Thursday and Sunday Group

he work at Gennets Bridge Lock (GBL) has gone on frantically to avoid the winter weather while closing the site down. As the brickwork came to the top of the lock wall, the copings for that part were made. The lock side at the back of the copings could then be brought up to the coping level with clay and top soil. Eventually the fence along the towpath side was erected with provision for a hedge to be planted, this November, on the path side of the fence. When the top sill wall was finished with the ekki bump block and blue engineering brick around the rim, the scaffolding in the lock could be removed and returned to Tickner's Depot. [Ekki is a very hard timber favoured for waterway uses. The bump block protects the wall from damage if the bows of a boat bump into it.]

With both sides of the lock completed, the hard-wearing grass seed could be sown. With 180m of new hedging to be planted on the site, the Trust is buying 770 plants (mainly hawthorn and blackthorn, but also rowan, hazel, silver birch, oak and other species) and getting 420 plants from the Woodland Trust.

We were amazed, some of the horse fraternity are calling the bridge at GBL 'Tilly's Bridge', because Tilly was the first horse across it. Generally, the comments from the users of the bridge, including the horse riders, are very complimentary.

In August we had a visit by the senior officer for Natural England (NE) in Kent and Sussex with a group of five of his team members. They were "Really impressed with the works the Trust have undertaken and pleased with the newt solutions you implemented." They recommend for the future "An organisation licence could be considered for the Trust ... "That's all good news for the Trust where at GBL using the site licence system, which was the only one available at the time, cost £20,000 and a delay of two years.

As part of the newt hibernacula, now taking shape on the site close to the bridge, it is

hoped to introduce some insect hotels. As all three newt ponds we built, as required in Natural England's European Protected Species Licence, were accepted by NE during their visit, the temporary newt pond in the canal was removed. The silt was removed from the canal section between the pond and the lock, which is ready for refilling by the winter rains.

Len Hasler and his group are preparing to pour concrete at the last bit of the lock, the bottom training walls. What a really mucky, muddy, wet job that is and they are to be thanked for sticking to it, that is the task in hand and the mud.

Kev Baker came and put the stop planks in at both ends of the lock, another major milestone achieved. He has replaced the stop planks in Gennets Sluice, so when water starts to flow from the lakes, which - surprisingly with the amount of rain we have had recently - has not started yet, the canal will fill.

There are two spoil heaps in River Drive, the woodland between the canal and the River Lox. Terry Spiller has profiled one and covered it with the silt from the canal bed, 'slop on the slope' you may say, anyway a very skilled job. A similar task is to be done next month on the other spoil heap. There are a number of oak saplings in the woodland that will be transplanted this winter onto the spoil heaps. Might they use this timber in 75 years' time to make a set of gates for GBL?

Monday Group

Nick Wood writes: In August we gave four of our regular sites a real 'going over'. In addition to the usual mowing and strimming, at the Drungewick aqueduct site, we repaired and modified the gate to Roger Dimmick Lane to prevent it being lifted off its hinges again by future miscreants; at Loxwood we cleared the ditch at the bottom of the canal bank and cut the overflow car park and kept up appearances at Devil's Hole and Southland Locks. We have been asked to 'look after' Gennets Bridge Lock

and its immediate environment too when Eric and his team move off site.

At the request of the landowner and working in co-operation with MWWP, our second August work party saw eight of us spending all day at Haybarn continuing cutting and trimming the hedge south of the swing bridge (as well as doing our usual tidying up around the swing bridge). The hedge was very thick and dense with long brambles mixed up with hawthorn etc. In October we continued with the hedge. We reckon we 'did' 80 yards which, given the large amount of work undertaken by MWWP on this site, leaves us only 90 yards short of Lee Farm causeway.

The October calendar gave us three Mondays in the month for our meetings. With the mild and sometimes damp weather our regular sites needed much attention with the result that our first two outings were spent working on them. As part of this we replaced two rotten fence posts at Devil's Hole Lock and tidied up Birch Copse. At Loxwood we cut all the overflow car park and cleared the ditch at the bottom of the canal bank. In addition, we mowed and strimmed Brewhurst Lock.

In fact we got out four times in October. On the 23rd the group spent all day at Lordings and once again cleared from the lock all the way to the flood gates and bridge. The towpath 'chain' stile (south of the bridge) was re-installed following repair by Tony Clear.

Tyres were pumped up, electrics checked, bulbs and plugs replaced ensuring that it was once again useable. With luck Tony will be able to use it for many years to come.

Letter to the Editor

Member John Chambers, who was Head of the UK Time Service from 1993 to 1996, writes:

Although the information on the plaque on p27 of Wey-South 180 may well be true ["on this site Sept 5, 1782 nothing happened"], I suspect that the date was meant to be in 1752, when September 2nd was followed by September 14th in England, Wales and Scotland.

"In seventeen hundred and fifty-two the Calendar changed from old to new. Eleven days were lost, you will remember, from the month of September"

It is an intriguing suggestion, especially as in November 2017 we mark the 100th anniversary of the October Revolution in Russia (Russia did not adopt the Gregorian calendar until February 1918, by which time 13 days had to be skipped). However, we suspect this was simply a randomly chosen date and an ironic comment on the number of blue plaques appearing across the countryside - Ed.

The Claverton Pumping Station is a rare surviving example of the technology of the late Georgian period. The pump started work in 1813 and operated continuously until 1952. This amazing piece of engineering uses the power of the River Avon to lift water up 48ft into the Kennet & Avon Canal above. Burning no fuel and making no waste, it is the ultimate in environmentally friendly technology.


