Eric Walker Group

The group has continued with its work on the Birtley Bridge 2 site. Having successfully completed the first concrete pour to the abutment walls, the team continued to erect the reinforcement for the next "lift" to the walls on both the east and west sides of the structure. With the reinforcement complete, work started to erect the formwork to the west abutment. This is the most complex part of the structure with the bridge support beams to the rear of the main abutment wall and the construction of the "box-out" on the canal side to accommodate the bridge deck.



The whole section will be poured in one operation to avoid a potentially weakening construction joint but it creates the problem of stopping the "box-out" formwork from "floating" upwards under the pressure of the mass of concrete below it. Luckily, having experienced civil engineers on the team, we hope a solution has been found but that will only become evident when we carry out the pour, planned for the 2nd March!

Three companies have been invited to tender for the bridge superstructure and hydraulic lifting mechanism and all have visited site to determine site conditions, access etc.



Work has also continued dredging and bank profiling on the section of canal to the north of the bridge location.

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Northern Working Party

Work has continued throughout February with the fence erecting at Elmbridge Village, where their property borders the canal, and a total of 84 panels with concrete posts, stretching approx 170 metres, have been installed so far. Progress is steadily being made and we are about two thirds of the way through. Having now got the hang of it, we look forward to finishing the task in March and moving on or otherwise (some of to something different!



We have also been supporting the sad but necessary effort to remove dead and dying Ash trees due to the 'Ash Dieback'. We have been helping out with cutting timber and clearing away debris on land and also in the canal using the work boat May Upton. One positive aspect which has come out of the tree removal is that we have produced several tons of logs for firewood.

Initially we did the job by hand with splitting mauls but more recently we were presented with a log

splitter made 'in house' for the purpose and hydraulically powered from the Trust's telehan-

A brilliant piece of kit which can handle just about any timber, knotty which would be impossible to split with a maul or axe).

A short race between splitting mauls and the log splitter was neck and



neck to start with but, after a while, the splitter powered ahead because it doesn't get tired!

Odd Job Group

Throughout February, we have continued to tidy and position. improve conditions at the Dunsfold Depot. Mainly we have concentrated on storing equipment where it can be more easily found, in a safe and secure environment.



All water pump piping is now stored on newly constructed scaffold racking.

Wiring for lighting in two of the large sheds has been installed and is awaiting final connection by an approved engineer. Supports for a new veranda in front of the welfare cabin have been erected and the work will be completed shortly. Next to the welfare cabin. concrete bases were



formed and poured and the portacabin from the slipway lifted onto them - for Adam's new office!

The two chemical store cabinets have been moved and are being renovated. A good amount of work has been completed and the Depot is now starting to look much more organised.

Boat Maintenance

I have been away for most of the month on holiday but work has proceeded on Josias Jessup in my absence, to the exclusion of all other boat maintenance, apart from emergencies.

The refit of JJ is proving to be the biggest job that we have yet tackled, especially in the cold weather, in the open, on the slip.

Ian has hired a great array of kit, a 3kw welder, wire, gas, a gas bottle and more. This will cost the Trust over a thousand pounds but is still



infinitely cheaper that hauling JJ out and trucking her to a shipyard for partial replating, as we did a couple of years back for Zachariah Keppel. That cost the Trust £25,000 or thereabouts.

Ian and Brian have started the reconstruction work by welding up the very corroded rudder bearing and channel bar supporting it. Guy and I are working on overside and aft fenders to protect the new black hull paintwork, plus painting up the new steelwork as it



is welded in place, including the corroded hatch drain areas. The prop shaft bearing will need new packing and greasing and new, sacrificial anodes will be fitted. Hopefully she will be back at her canal centre berth and ready for service by the third week of March.

Then we have to sort out the deck of Wiggonholt where the new grey floor paint has been worn away by the flock of Santa trip passengers.

Mrs Bucket Group Keeping Up Appearances on Mondays

As it had dried out a bit underfoot a good start was made in February by giving attention to Malham Lock, although getting temporarily stuck with one of the volunteer's cars did happen. Despite not having visited since last June, growth of the vegetation was not as great as we had expected. Both sides of the lock and the bank into the field were cut and raked, leaving the site a lot tidier.

However, we would welcome any suggestions for obtaining a boat which we can take down to the site so that we can remove the foliage that is growing out of the lock walls. A job for another time.

We have cut and cleared the towpath between Devil's Hole and Southland Locks by adopting the Trust's new clearance policy of 50 yards of the towpath bank canal side followed by 50 yards of the non-canal side of the towpath.

On the 20th we cut the top and side of the towpath hedge and, where appropriate, the bank between Loxwood Lock and Brewhurst Bridge. The mass of cuttings were carried to the area offside Brewhust Lock where they will be disposed of in due course.

The following Monday we worked on the hedge above and below Barnsill Bridge, so we are well on



the way towards tidying up all the way from David Arnold Drungewick Aqueduct to the Loxwood Canal Centre. With a bit of luck we shall complete this in March before the birds start doing their thing.
