Midweek Working Party

Monday Group

With five meetings in September, we completed clearing the construction compound at Tickner's, cut both sides of the towpath between Devil's Hole and Southland locks and widened the towpath between the Drungewick Aqueduct site and the spillway towards Barnshill bridge.

As usual, we tidied up around the Canal Centre and visited Compasses, Tickner's Road Bridge, Gennets, Southland, Devil's Hole, Loxwood and Brewhurst Locks as well as the Drungewick slipway and Newbridge. All in all, a good month's work.

Thursday Group

Heavy rain curtailed our activities somewhat on our first outing of the month, so we took advantage of the shelter at Tickner's Depot to apply preservative to the pre-assembled parts of the new stop plank shelter. We also spent some time sorting and tidying the workshop and toolshed at Tickner's Crossing in readiness for the re-commissioning of the yard.

We couldn't stay out of the rain all day though and went to Gennets Bridge Lock to recover a load of barriers for taking down to the Surrey Hills Wood Fair the next day.

The following week, the weather was a little kinder and assembly of the stop plank shelter began at Drungewick Lock. All was going well until heavy rain stopped play later in the day and prevented the shelter roof being installed. At the same time, a small team went to Drungewick Slipway to stabilise the landing stage on that side of the canal. More bracing was fitted and the planks re-secured, making the whole structure much more solid.

We also assisted in transporting a tractor and grass cutter to Gennets Bridge Lock for the long grass in the WACT owned field just south of the lock to be mown.

Half the team returned to Drungewick Lock the next week and completed construction of the stop plank shelter by installing the sheet metal roof. All



stop planks are now neatly stacked away and the whole site is looking much tidier. The other half of the team went to Lee Place Bridge where we stabilised the nearby milestone and added a stop plank to the overflow weir by Lordings Flood Lock.

For our final Thursday of the month, we split into three teams. One team worked at Tickner's Depot fabricating some steel prototype buckets that we intend fixing on Lordings waterwheel to improve per-Nick Wood formance by increasing the volume of water that can

Help was also provided to the Depot Team in removing more of the scaffolding structure of the log bays roof, in readiness for a new solid roof to be fitted.

The other team returned to Lordings Flood Lock where a worn and damaged strap hinge was removed from one of the gates for a repair to be assessed. The wrought iron strap is believed to be over 200 years old, so

Tickner's Depot

The saga of the log store roof continues – but it should be over soon. In preparation for the new roof arriving, we had a team of six from the NWP come in and start lowering the existing roof. In my naivety, I thought it would just be a case of loosening the clamps lowering the whole roof by 60cm and clamp it all back up again. However, the weight of the scaffold poles meant that this could never happen, so the



Longitudinal poles were removed, with the Ledgers, and repositioned 60cm lower. The guys did an excellent job and finished the first of the three bays. Two days later the left bay was also lowered. The roof materials have now been delivered and I can see this mini project will be ready for a topping out ceremony in the very near future.

As Ian and I have been away for a fortnight (separately) there's not much else to report except - the wasp nest has been dealt with, the 3-tonne dumper repair and service is well under way, Mrs F has visited us twice and already made a big difference in tidying up the Archive and Record Store, but with much more still to do. We have repaired and serviced two of the Monday Working Party strimmers and cleaned, maintained and sharpened three chainsaws.
