The work refurbishing Tickner's Depot is almost complete, with only one or two tasks to finish. We still have not been able to get SSE to install a meter, despite all of our installation and wiring having been completed for some weeks. I estimate that, subject to the delivery of the toilet unit and effluent storage tank, our work will be completed in early June.

We have fabricated the timber props ready for installation in Drungewick Lock and have had two attempts to drain the lock by pumping over the stop planks into the section/pound south of the lock. Unfortunately as the stop plank channel is missing from the south west wall of the lock, we have been unable to make a good seal. Despite using our 6in pump, which is capable of moving a substantial amount of water, we have not been able to completely drain the lock and it re-fills very quickly following the pump being switched off. It may be necessary to totally drain the section of canal/pound south of the lock, in order to clear all the water and a substantial amount of debris in the lock prior to the next phase of investigations, the core drilling of the west wall. In the meantime we will attempt to install the timber props.

Following the completion of the tree felling and a recent meeting with the land owner at Harsfold Bridge, we have agreed a location for our site compound on his land. We hope to mobilise and complete this in June and this will enable us to start constructing the bridleway diversion, whilst leaving in the existing causeway to allow access for farm equipment to carry out harvesting operations. As soon as the harvest is complete and the bridleway is diverted we will be able to commence the bridge construction, which could be in late August.

### Northern & Summit Working Party


Apologies for no report from the NWP last time. We made one visit to Birtley in April, to complete the boundary fencing along the western bank of the canal as well as alongside the proposed footpath from the bridge site (Bridge 1) back to the Downs Link. We will now pause on this activity before returning to the section north from Birtley Bridge (Bridge 2) towards Bramley in the autumn.

If April was quiet then May has been the opposite. Work is now really gearing up to the start of lift

bridge construction during the WRG camps in July. NWPG visited Birtley for three days at the beginning of May. The objective was to finish surfacing the access road from where we left off in October so that vehicles can reach the Bridge 1 site. We completed the whole length less about 50m under the power lines which, for safety reasons, can only be done with the Trust's tea spoon digger or by hand!

Another job was to build a temporary scaffold footbridge across the canal at Bridge 1 so that workers can access both banks of the canal without a long west bank deviation uphill and down dale. Thanks to Rob Nicholson and James Upton for building us such a fine bridge. It was also the first use of the Trust's telehandler. We built the structure on the bank before launching it across the canal thus saving having to wade around in the sludge.

Back at Bridge 2, another team spent three days working on the overflow weir which was in very poor condition with water running off the canal and eroding the bank. The work involved digging out the sludge and using concrete filled sandbags to build a support/cascade, back filled with hardcore and which has surfaced with paving slabs over which the water will flow. Although temporary, it is a solid

structure which should protect the bank until such time as we build a controlled sluice as part of the second lift bridge.

During the three days we had the assistance of no fewer than 22 different volunteers, not to mention the large array of plant and equipment for moving everything around - all of which help us to complete our objectives.

Two further visits by NWP during May have seen further work at the weir (now almost complete) and the access road (now 15m short of complete). An earth dam has been put across the canal at Bridge 1 and the canal has been pumped down to reveal a vegetative sludge. The next job will be to remove this and complete the bridge design (ground investigation work was also carried out in May). We are hopeful that the excavation for the bridge base can be completed in time for when the first of the WRG/ NWPG camp volunteers arrive on 7 July, so that we can get straight on with forming the steelwork in time for a concrete pour at the end of the week.

Readers may be aware of the appeal launched at the Trust AGM to raise funds for the two lift bridges

at Birtley. Contributions would be most welcome and details of how to give can be found on the Trust's website. Please support the appeal if you can.

## PEST Boat Group

**D**uring May the PEST team worked on the navigation north of Devils Hole Lock for the first time. Whilst the navigation is fairly wide and free from dangerous outgrowth the effects of some years of inattention are apparent.

Our first objective is clearing outgrowth near bends to provide better lines of sight for boat crew and progress was made to this end. It was apparent that by clearing outgrowth from the offside bank 1m or more of width can be recovered for navigation. Work continues but the team is constrained by the need to avoid disturbing nesting birds at this time of year.

We also made a foray south from the Canal Centre down to the Drungewick Slipway specifically to remove various 'floating islands' of vegetation and a number of floating logs and branches that had become hazards for boat operations.
