Mrs Bucket Group - Keeping Up Appearances on Mondays

Thanks to a good turnout of volunteers on 11th February (the 4th was cancelled due to heavy rain), we managed to almost complete our winter task in Sidney Wood (see last WPN). I say almost it's with the exception of a small amount of nonurgent tidying up on the non-towpath side of the canal, which we will do later in the year. The towpath and offside of the canal now looks a lot better all the way from Firtree Copse to Lock 16 (1500 yards).

Working under the direction of Dave Evans we spent two glorious sunny and warm Mondays at Gosden Aqueduct building a new fence and associated bits and pieces on the downstream side of the aqueduct, thereby replacing the Heras fencing. We also repaired the vandalised notice board and created a compound for the bricklayer who is expected shortly to repair the upstream side of the aqueduct. Progress on the fencing (all completed) allowed a detachment of some members of the group to visit Hunt Park for tidying up and opening out views of the river.

We have a number of tasks in hand for March. More of that next time, but with the warm weather we may have to make a start on our regular sites too. Nick Wood

Summit Working Party and Visiting Groups

ebruary has been a month of bungalows and boats. Each day we have been working has been blessed by glorious sunshine - that is provided we were not at Birtley where the weather for some reason is very often against us.

As expected, dismantling the log bungalow at Philip Oliver's house was a task and a half. Day one was spent taking down the inner linings, windows, doors and insulation from which hundreds if not thousands of nails had to be extracted and timbers stacked. Once the scaffolding had arrived late from Speedy Hire, we were able to get up onto the roof to start taking off the metal sheet tiles - again to be stacked

Day 2 concentrated on removing the roof, an activity that got fully into swing once Dave had worked out a system - about three quarters had gone by the end of the day. Our hope was to finish on the Friday so that the expected larger Saturday team could work back at Birtley. To achieve this we would have to remove the rest of the roof, most of the side walls, the internal wall and the floor. By midmorning it looked like another day was inevitable.

However Dave Evans, as he does in these situations, came up with a plan to deal with the floor cut it up into small enough chunks that could be loaded into the horse box of the cabin's new owners at Westlands Farm. It worked and as a result the job was complete by 5.30pm and we were in the pub for a well - earned pint by 6! You can't say that volunteering for the Wey & Arun doesn't provide variety.

We made it to Birtley for the third Saturday where a partly exhausted team continued with fencing the west (non towpath) side of our boundary from the

The dredging teams are being established and if anyone wants to join us please let me know. The same applies to our Birtley work.

Coming up we have four days completing a concrete road/ramp at the Dunsfold slipway on 23 - 26th March plus our usual third Saturday at Birtley on 16th March.

Tickner's Heath Depot

Since the last report the group has been predominantly working on the Tickner's Depot refurbishment.

After a long delay there has been progress in the installation of the electricity mains supply. The trench has been dug between the substation and the switchboard kiosk on the site. A specialist contractor laid the cable on 14th February. Work has also started digging the trench for the site distribution cable to the new workshop and the small Nissen storage huts. We completed work to the new workshop and we helped John Smith and his team move the plant and equipment from the old workshop.

On 18th March a specialist contractor will start the removal of the asbestos roof to the old workshop and we will commence partial demolition and conversion into sand, aggregate and bulk material storage bays. A waste storage tank has been delivered and installed and a new hazardous materials store will be created, allowing the old 'fuel' store to be demolished, following the asbestos roof removal.

A small team has also been assisting Kevin Baker to construct a concrete and brick landing stage at Brewhurst Lock.
